GO FESTIVE WILDLIFE SPOTTING

It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas! Take this guide on your next walk and see which natural wonders you spot.





Starlings
As the evenings draw in, starlings put on
a spectacular show in the sky called a murmuration.
By mid-December, their numbers are boosted by birds
overwintering in the UK and they fly in their thousands.



December moth
Looking like it is dressed for the cold, the furry
December moth is one of the few moths active during
UK winters. To keep itself warm, the moth often vibrates its wings. Look out for it in hedgerows, woodlands and gardens.



Mountain hare
If you live in Scotland, you might
be treated to a "white Christmas" by
spotting this small animal. Its coat
turns white in the winter to hide it
from predators in the snow.



What could be more Christmassy than seeing Rudolph and pals? Wild reindeer were once common in the UK, but a free-ranging herd of around 150 still roams Scotland's Cairngorms.
