Dress up as a mummy.

Play a manic mummy game

What you need

- 2 willing adults
- 2 teams of friends or family
- Lots of toilet rolls – at least one per team member

Instructions

Get your adults to stand in the centre of the room with the teams around them, each holding a toilet roll. On the count of "1, 2, 3... go!" each team must wrap the toilet paper around their adult's body, arms, legs and head until they look like an Egyptian mummy. The first team to complete their "mummy" is the winner.

This is a great game for a Halloween party.

Make a spooky snack

What you need

- 1 red apple
- Peanut butter or raspberry jam
- White mini marshmallows
- Knife or apple slicer
- Spoon
- Plate

Instructions

First, cut the apple into slices using a knife or an apple slicer. Next, take two slices and spread peanut butter or jam (if you want it to be extra gruesome) onto one side of each slice. Stick the mini marshmallows in a line along the slice, using the peanut butter or jam as glue to keep them in place. Sandwich the two slices together like lips, with the marshmallow teeth in the middle, then arrange them on a plate.

Be careful when slicing the apples. Ask an adult to help.

Make this glittery wand.

Create a wizard's wand

What you need

- Scissors
- Old cereal box
- A stick – try to find one that is shaped like the wand you like best
- Paintbrush
- Paint – any colour but black works best
- Glitter – any colour
- 2 tin cans

Instructions

To begin, cut the front off the cereal box to make a tray for your project. Now, holding one end of the stick, paint the whole of the stick – making sure the paint is nice and thick. Holding the painted stick over the cereal box tray, shake the glitter all over the stick – do this quickly before the paint dries.

When you are happy with the amount of glitter you have on the stick, balance it on the two tin cans to dry, then you can make your magic. Abracadabra!
